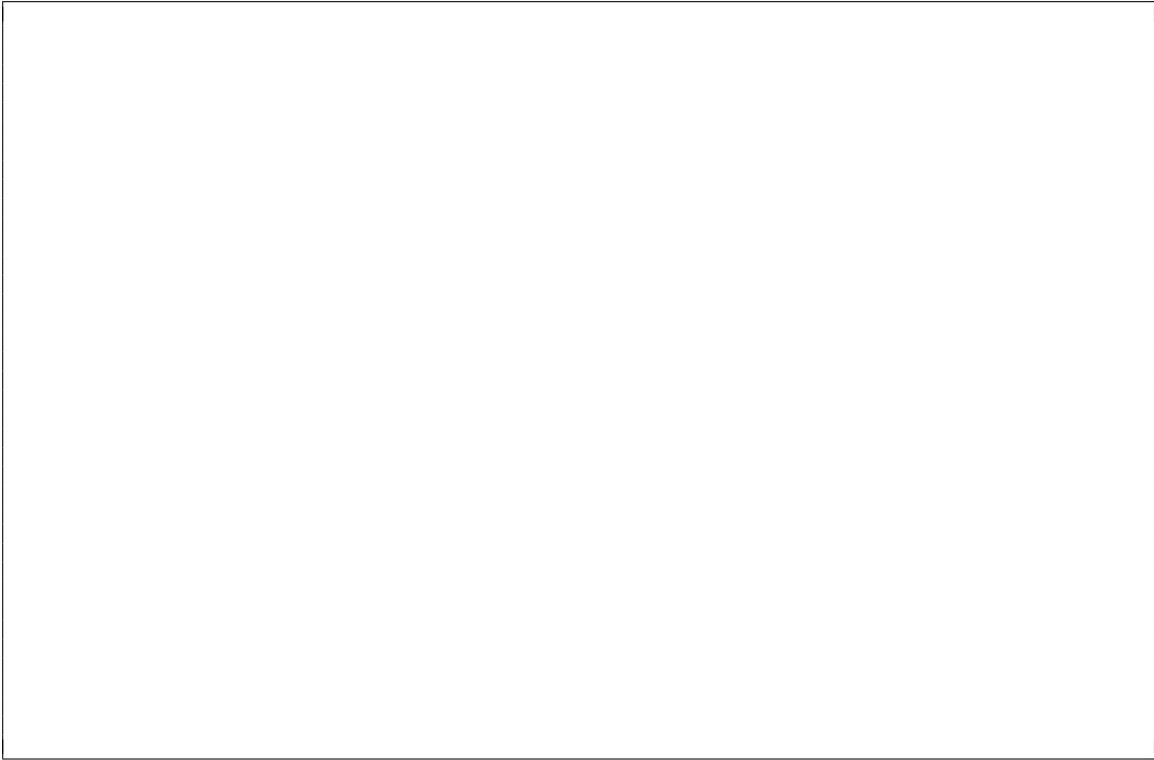
1. The subject matter is in full accordance with the study guide.

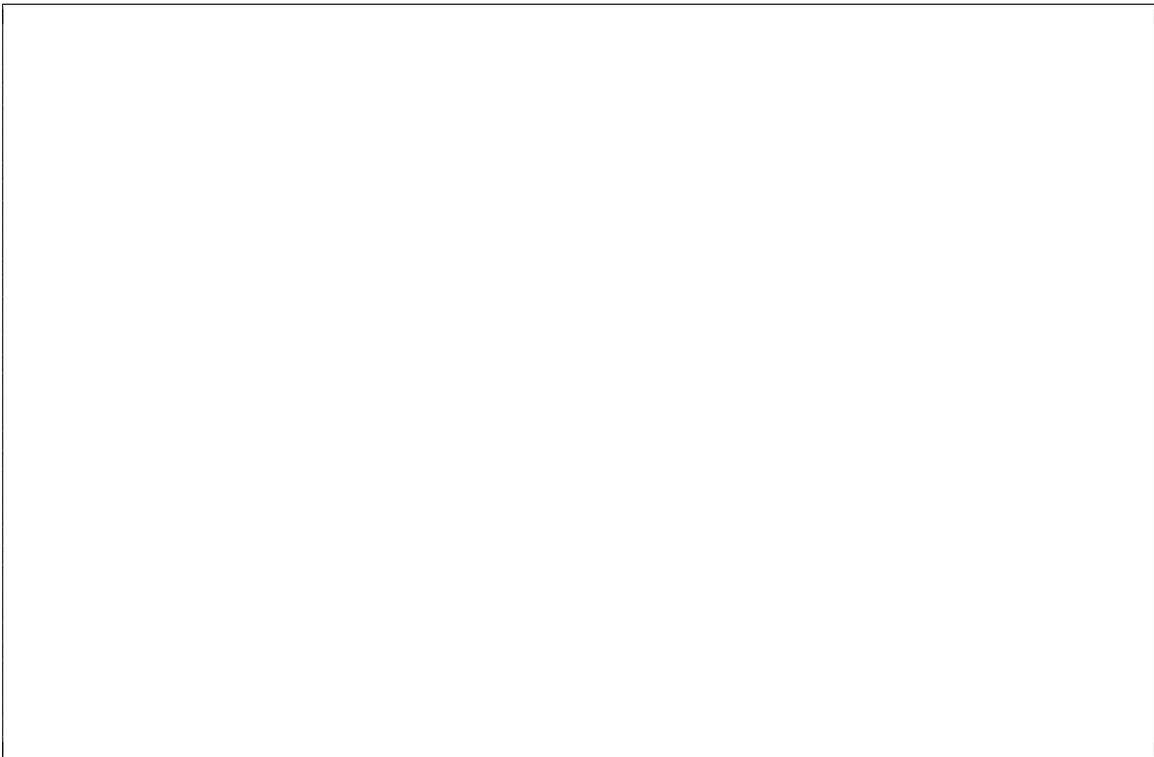
Lesson 1.1

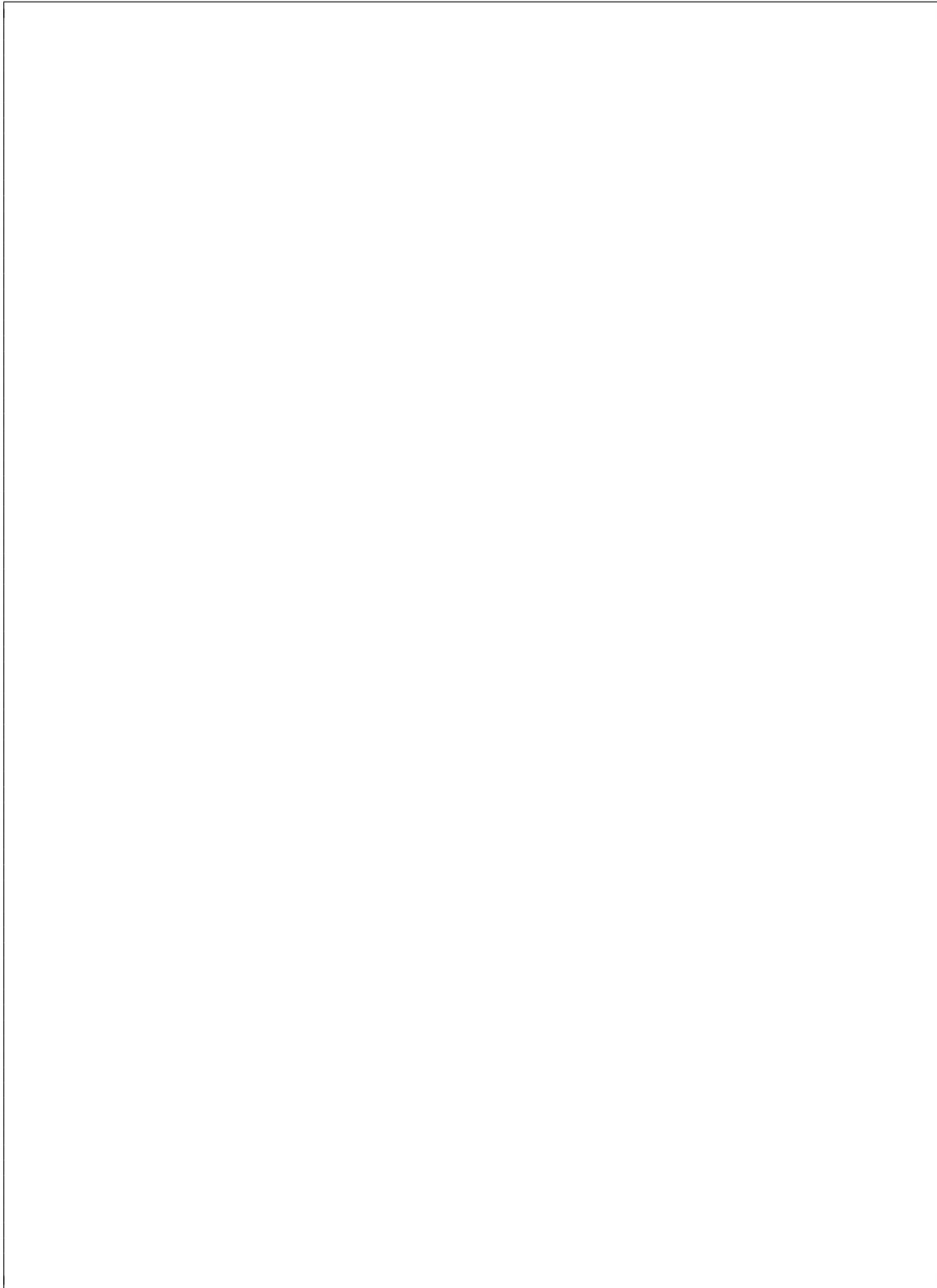
Explain in your own words how boundary representation allows us to store 3D objects using 2D data structures.

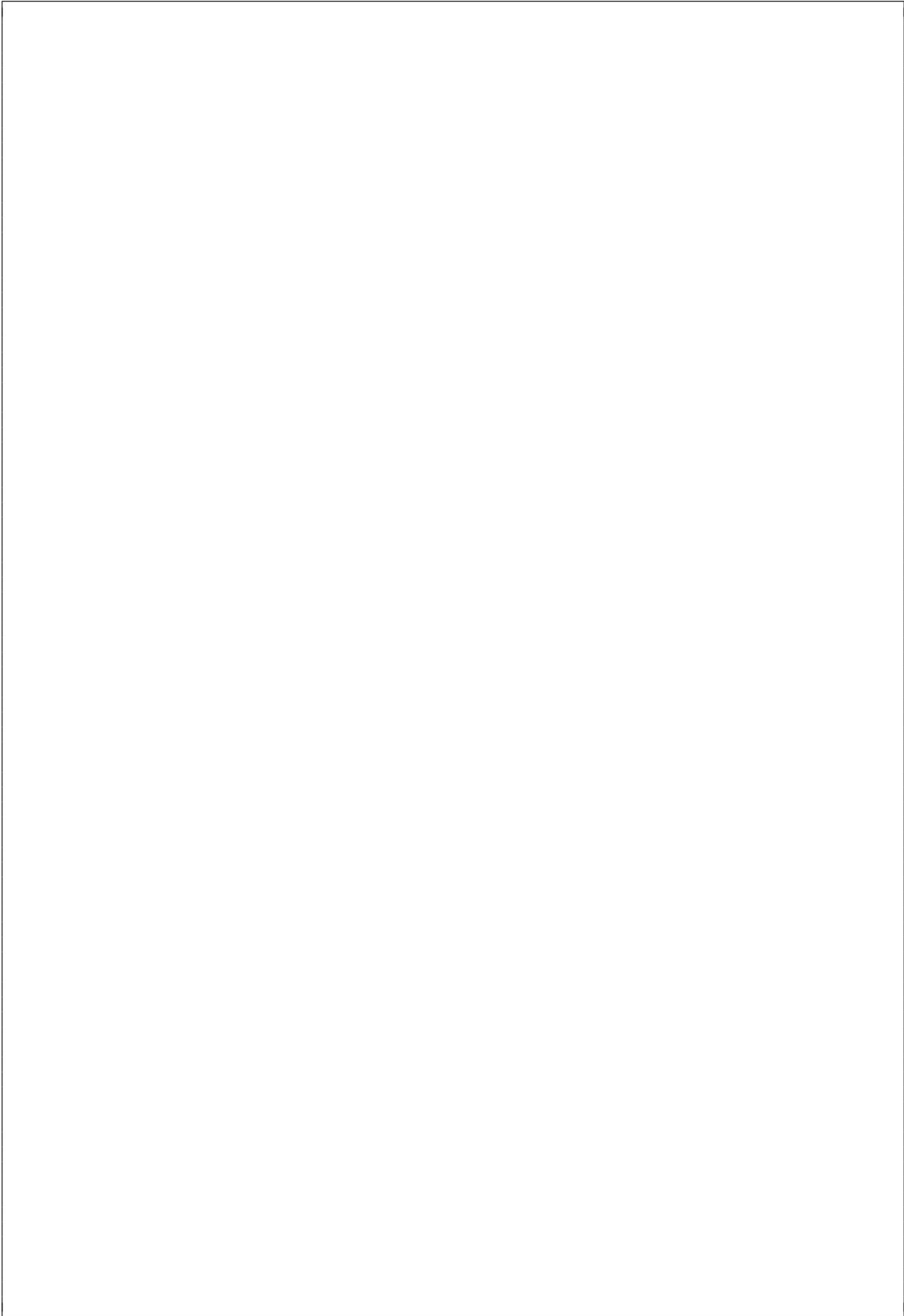
In a 2D generalised map:

- (b) Draw an example map to demonstrate it. ($\frac{1}{2}$ point)



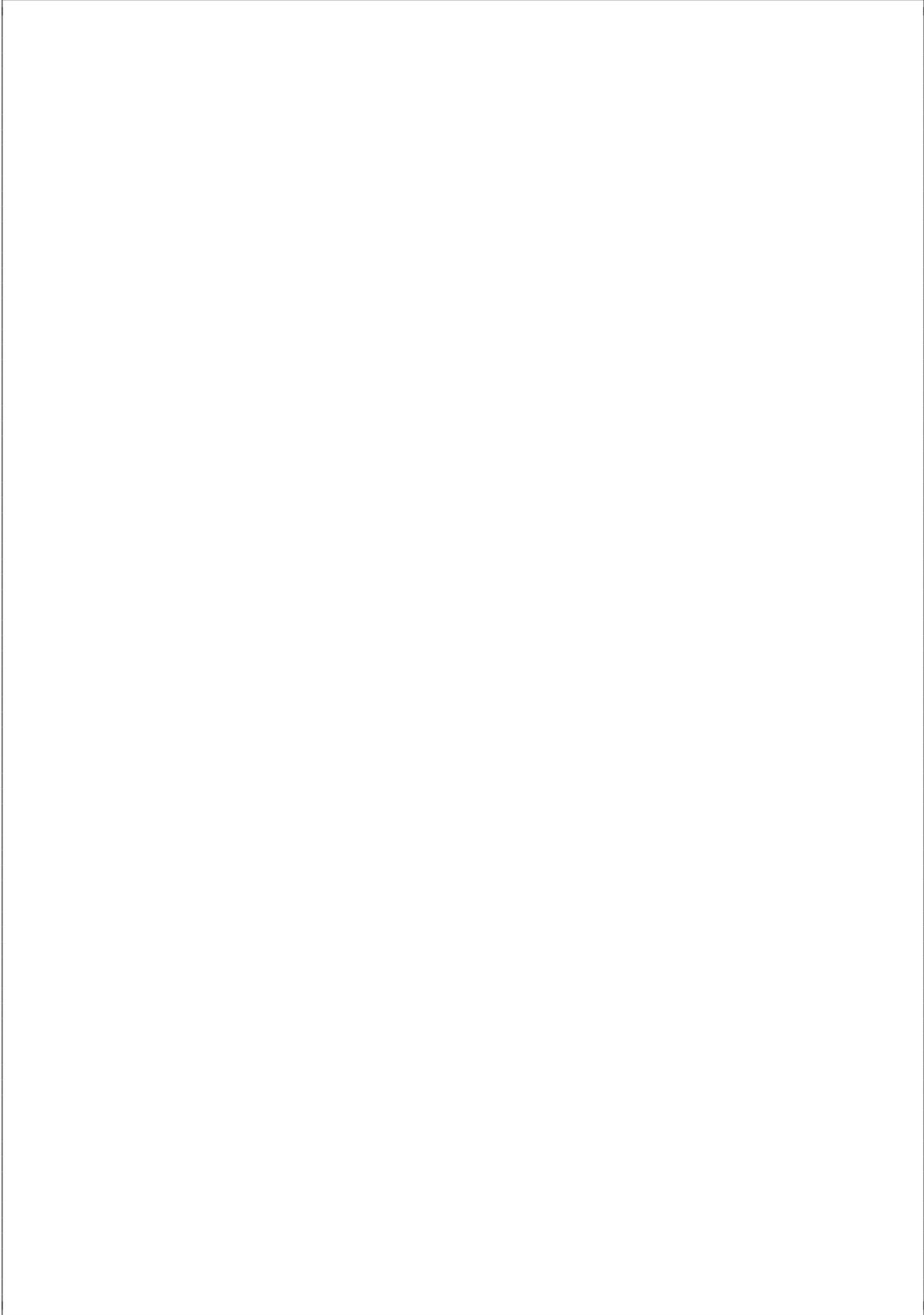
Lesson 2.2

Consider a voxelised version of a tile of the 3D BAG. Using it as an example, explain how a sparse representation could help you store this model more efficiently.



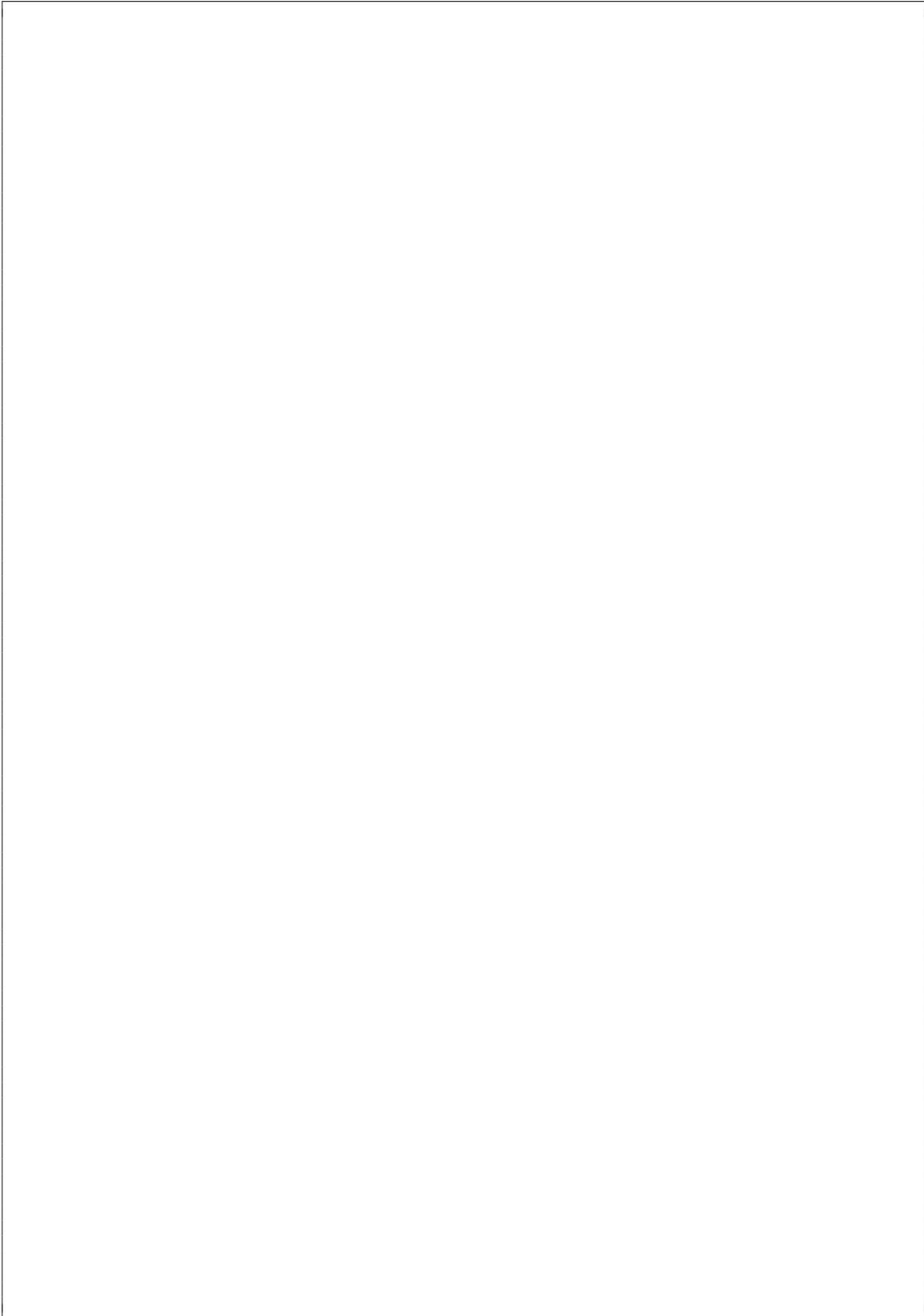
Lesson 3.1

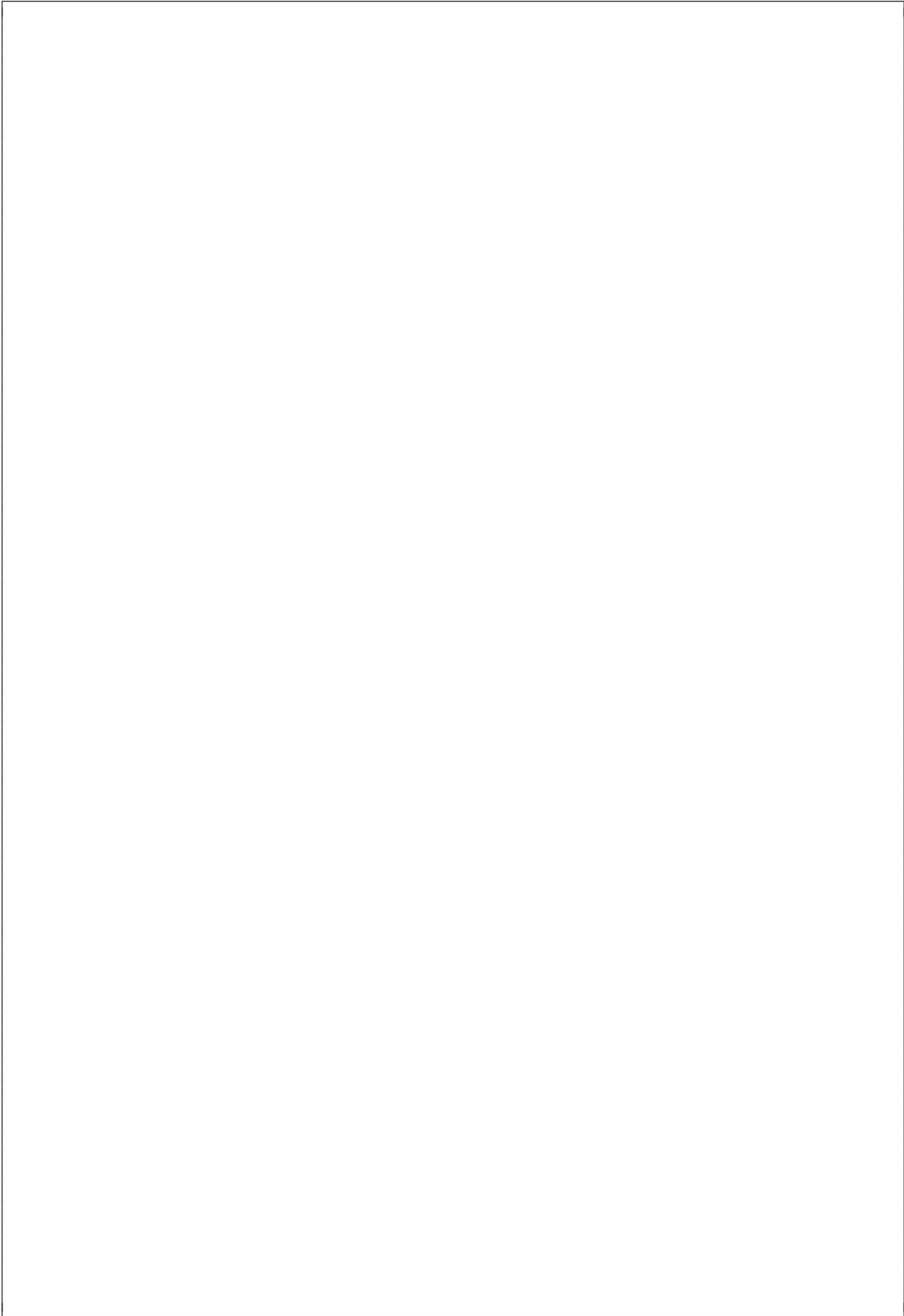
Lesson 3.2

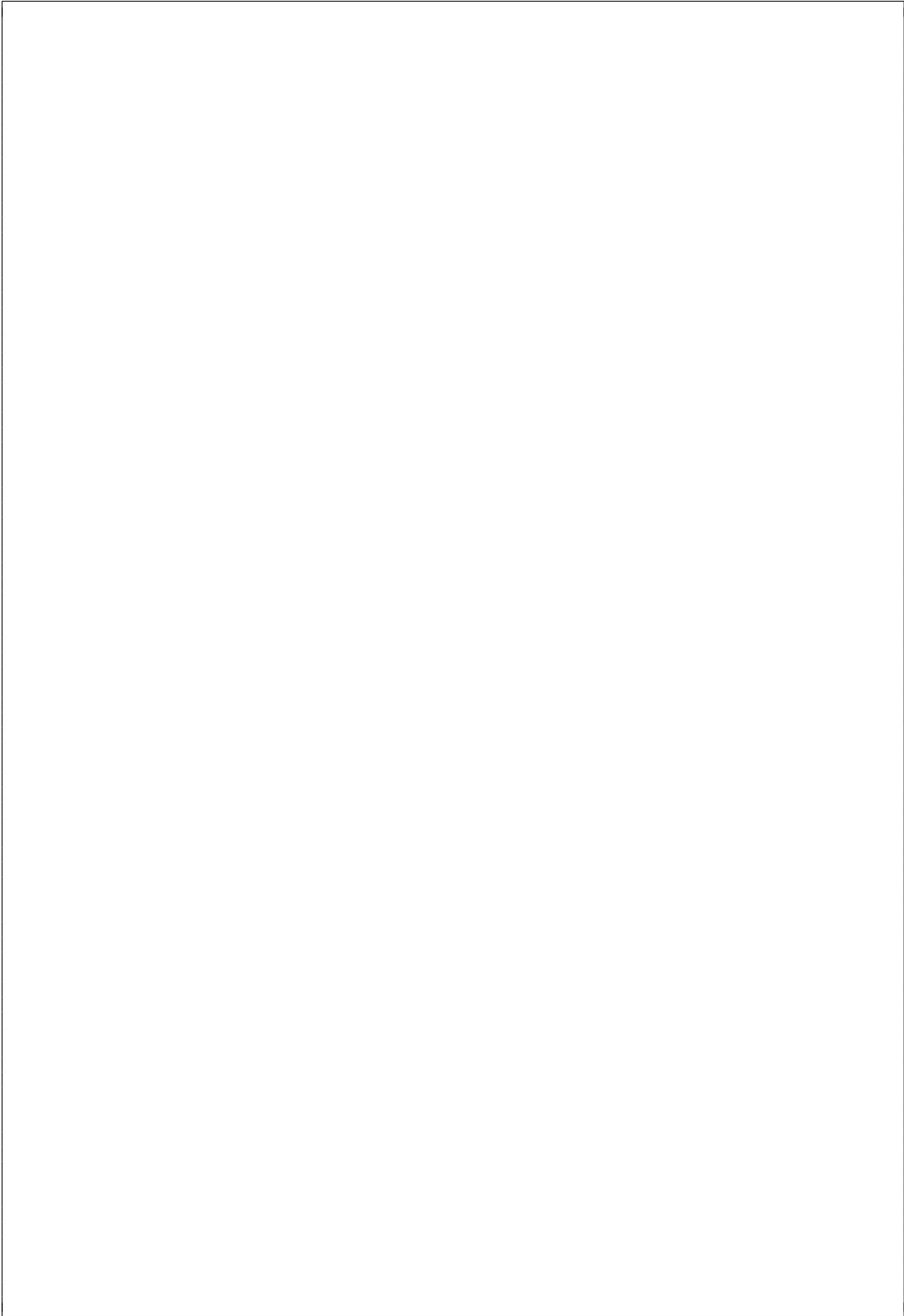
Lesson 4.1

3D city models should ideally be *spatio-semantically coherent*. Describe briefly what this concretely means, and give an example where it is useful in practice.



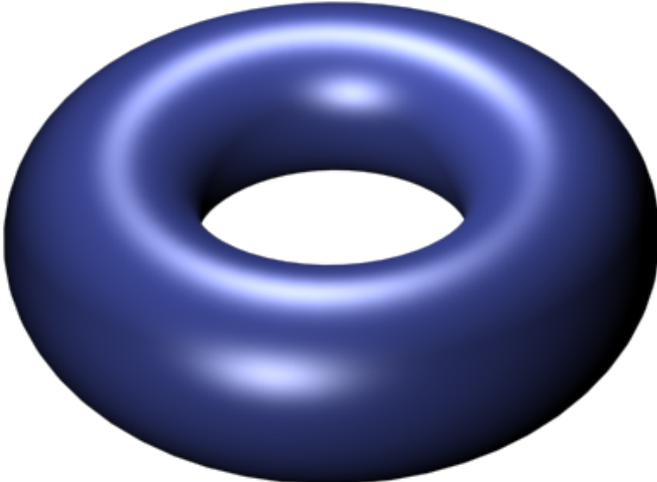
Lesson 4.2

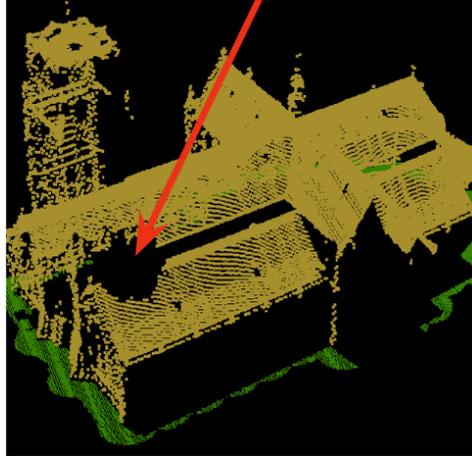

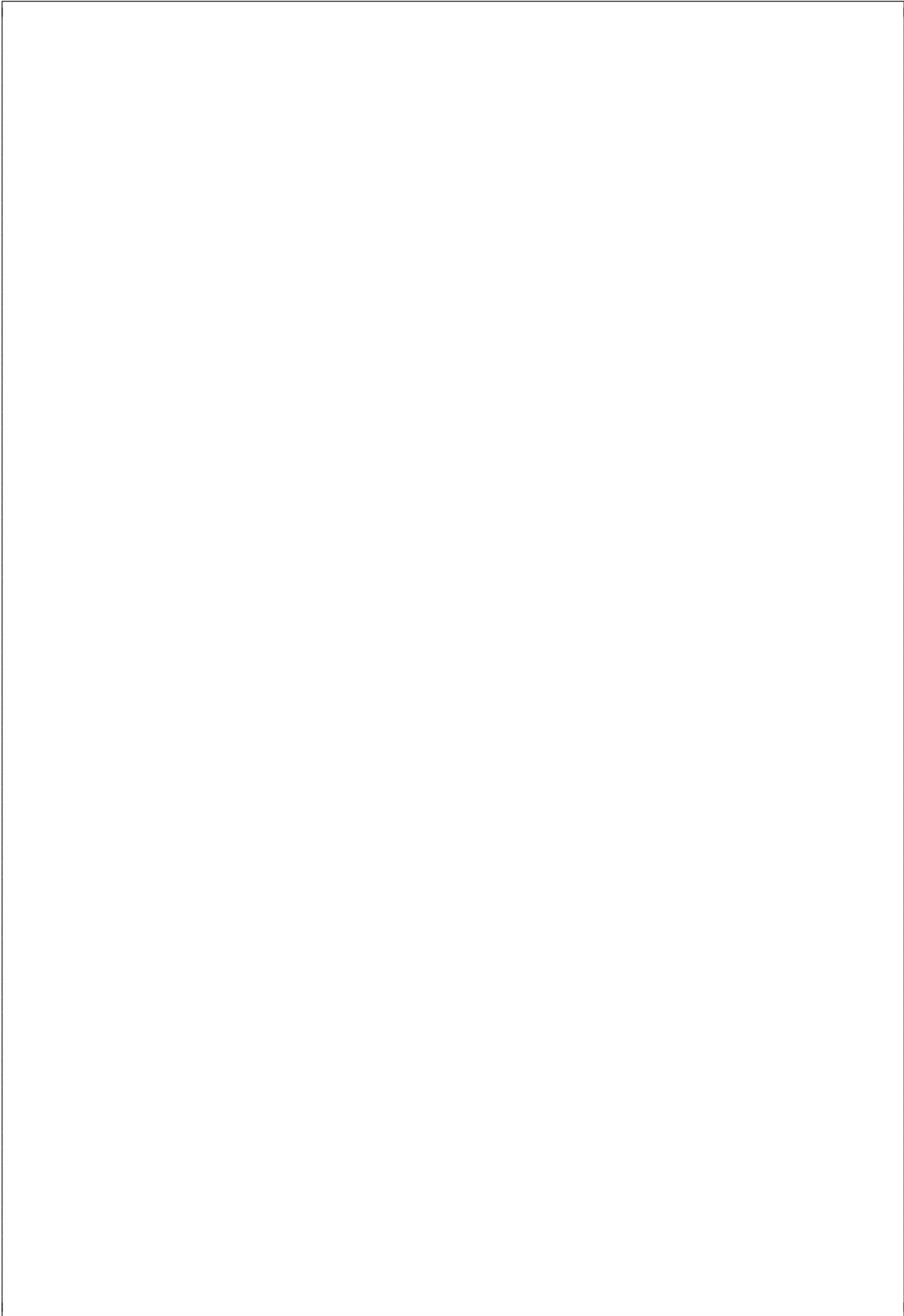
