

1. (10 points) It is mentioned in the Chapter 1 of the book that "a point cloud is an incomplete representation for a terrain". Explain what that means. 2. (10 points) Draw a set of 10 points in the plane such that its Voronoi diagram has 5 unbounded Voronoi cells, and one Voronoi vertex has a degree of 5. You can write down in word your reasoning also.

3. (10 points) Draw the 2D *k*d-tree for this set of 6 points, and explain briefly how you obtained this result.

4. (10 points) You are asked to create isolines of the SRTM file cristoredentor.tif, which was given to you for the hw02. You use QGIS/GDAL functions to extract the isolines at every 25m and you obtain those lines: not very smooth and several unconnected components. Describe a methodology that you could apply to the data to improve the output isolines. The description should be at a higher level and speak in terms of algorithms and/or methods, not in terms of buttons you could press in QGIS.







5. (10 points) We know the slope for a given location (x, y): its gradient (α) is 15° and its aspect (θ) is 245°. Draw the (hypothetical) isolines for the area surrounding this location, and identify clearly where that point would be. An estimation and guessing of the surrounding is fine.

6. (10 points) You downloaded a raster terrain (GeoTiff format) that contains several cells with no_data values. There are groups of several adjacent no_data cells (10+), not only individual cells. Describe in detail a methodology/algorithm you will use to fill these with a meaningful value.

7. (10 points) In the book in Section 4.1, there is a list of 7 properties that an ideal interpolation method should have: exactness, continuity, smoothness, locality, adaptability, computational efficiency, and automation. Explain, in a few words, how well kriging fulfils each of them (or not) and why. 8. (10 points) You are given an unclassified aerial lidar point cloud of a large forest in a mountainous area (see images for an overview and a cross-section). You are given the task to create a grid that contains the height of the canopy for each grid cell. Describe how you could best achieve this using the methods you learned in this course.





9. (10 points) Section 7.3 of the book links to two methods to deal with sinks in runoff modelling (sink filling and least-cost drainage paths). Which do you think is better? Justify your reasoning by listing the key advantages of your preferred method over the other one.

10. (10 points) The image below shows a point cloud of a cube and a number of planes (eg the blue, green, yellow and grey ones) that were detected using the RANSAC algorithm as given in the book. Explain per RANSAC parameter (ϵ , n, k as given in the book) how to change it (eg should it be higher or lower) to decrease the likelihood that spurious planes like the grey one (that is not on any side of the cube) are generated.

Notice that only the boundary surface of the cube has points on it, the interior is empty.
